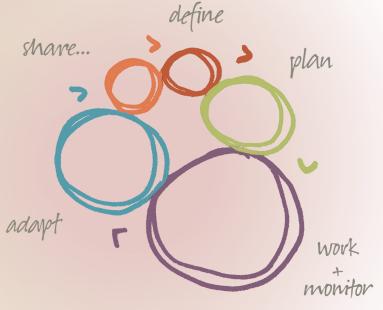

In the 1970s, the land became the Triabunna woodchip mill, the world's largest, tearing through ancient forests. So, when the whole mill came up for sale in 2011, they bought it to turn something awful into something beautiful.
